Current placements include The Bolton Review, with student editors working to deliver the university's in-house arts magazine; The New Writing Showcase, creating and producing the university's professional stage performance of new student writing; Carcanet Press, working at the offices of one of Manchester's major independent publishers; and the Hay Festival, Hay-on-Wye, gaining insight into preparations for one of the UK's most popular literature festivals.

Students have also gained insight from recent industry guest speakers including Ellen McLeod, co-director of The Poetry Business; Kevin Duffy, founder and director of Blue Moose Press; Alex Keelan, playwright; Stephen Hornby, scriptwriter; and Clare Gannaway, Curator of Contemporary Art at Manchester Art Gallery.

Journeying to the Brontë Parsonage Museum and stunningly atmospheric Haworth moorland, students were recently treated to a guided tour around the Parsonage and a talk about the inspirational Brontë family. We visited Charlotte and Emily's grave and had chance to explore the village cafes and pubs.

LECTURERS AWARDED RESEARCH PRIZES

English and Creative Writing lecturers, Dr Kim Edwards Keates, Dr Evan Jones and Dr Valerie O'Riordan were recently awarded prestigious Jenkinson Research Prizes in recognition of their ongoing research activities. Valerie received Research Publication of the Year award for her O. Henry prize winning publication 'Bad Girl'; Kim received the Early Career Researcher of the Year award and a Ryley Award to support student research on the 'Whitman and Women' project, while Evan won a Jenkinson Award, funding research dedicated to English and Creative Writing's 'Whitman 200: Community and Diversity' project.

Professor Patrick McGhee commented that: "The 2020 Jenkinson Awards event has been the largest ever with a wide range of past and present projects recognised for excellence in the context of our Teaching Intensive, Research Informed philosophy."

POETRY OF OURSELVES COMMISSION

In the 1930s, Bolton was at the heart of Mass Observation, a large-scale investigation into the habits and customs of the people of Britain. One of the movement's founders, Charles Madge, a poet and journalist, saw Mass Observation as a form of "popular poetry" which would shed new light on everyday life. Creative Writing

students from the university, in conjunction with Bolton Library and Museum Services, have set about evoking the original participatory spirit.

The exhibition in the Worktown Gallery draws on extensive archives exploring Madge's early vision for Mass Observation. The museum has been inviting visitors to answer "if you weren't here, where would you be?" They embraced the activity with enthusiasm by supplying hundreds of answers, before the museum commissioned students to create new poems based on some of these answers, producing 'A Poetry of Ourselves'.


